When would you see/feel these consequences? Explain.

7. It was recently reported that astronomers had discovered a galaxy with a redshift of $z=8.55$.
 - a. Suppose that this galaxy has an optical emission line with an emitted wavelength of 500nm. At what wavelength would we (on Earth) observe this emission line, and to which part of the spectrum does this wavelength correspond?
 - b. Let's define the scale factor of the Universe at the current time to be $R_0=1$. What was the scale factor of the Universe at the time that we are seeing this galaxy?
 - c. Prof. Ned Wright at UCLA has produced an extremely useful web-based tool for calculating interesting cosmological quantities. Use his website to calculate the age of the Universe at the time we are seeing this galaxy. Assume a Hubble constant of 70 km/s/Mpc and default values for Ω_M and Ω_Λ . 8. Suppose that the Universe were not homogeneous, i.e., different parts of the Universe had different average properties and, in particular, densities. Explain why this would affect the concept of "cosmic time". How would this be related to gravitational redshift?
